The new Communicable Disease rules which took place beginning January 1, 2010 and remain in effect for the 2012-2013 School Reporting Year are as follows: Required for all children entering kindergarten, all 6th grade students, and all children changing school districts:

- Two doses of varicella vaccine or history of chickenpox disease Required for all children 11-18 years of age who are changing school districts or who are enrolled in 6th grade:
- One dose of meningococcal (MCV4 OR MPSV4) vaccine
- One dose of tetanus/diphtheria/ acellular pertussis (Tdap) vaccine

The Lapeer County Health Department will immunize children up to the age of 19 years with all required immunizations if they have one of the following:

- NO INSURANCE
- INSURANCE THAT DOESN'T COVER IMMUNIZATIONS
- MEDICAID
- AMERICAN INDIAN/ ALASKAN NATIVE DESCENT

Lapeer County Health Department can also immunize children up to the age of 19 years if they have the following:**

- A CO-PAY OR DEDUCTIBLE FOR INSURANCE
**Vaccines available for those who qualify with insurance include Tdap, Meningitis and Varicella, inventory is limited for those eligible with this option. We ask a fee of $\$ 12.00$ per injection but will not deny immunizations if unable to pay the fee.

IF INSURANCE FULLY COVERS IMMUNIZATIONS: You must go to their
Health Care Provider for immunizations.

The most prestigious award is the Female and Male Athlete of the Year. Head Coaches nominate seniors for this award and vote on the most deserving recipients utilizing the following criteria:

- Athlete must have demonstrated athletic excellence in at least one sport with preference given to athletes who have excelled in more than one sport. However, state or national recognition in one sport may be a determining factor vs. an athlete (with no state/ national recognition) who has league recognition in two or more sports.
- Athlete should have demonstrated academic excellence in the classroom and have an above average grade point average.
- Athlete should have demonstrated a commitment to North Branch High School and / or the community of North Branch in a leadership or volunteer capacity.

## The Grocery Give Away: a vision turned into action.

Although it was a long day and hard work for the first and third graders, they were able to persistently work throughout the day until the job was completed. By 3:30 we had the 154 boxes filled and were heading back to our classrooms.
During the Free Grocery Give Away we were able to give boxes of food to 154 families. We were out of food by 4:35 and unfortunately had to turn people away. This is an experience that Mrs. Bodnar's third grade class and Mrs. Shifflett's first grade class will never forget. Some of the students are already talking about what they will do next to make an even bigger difference in our community.
We would like to thank the volunteers and the North Branch Wesleyan Church that helped us make a difference. There are truly too many volunteers to name and I fear I may forget one if I try to list them all. Our volunteers helped teach our students that being a part of a community matters and that each one of us has a role to play in being a resident of North Branch.

# 2012 Water Quality Report for the Village of North Branch 

This report covers the drinking water quality for the Village of North Branch for the 2011 calendar year. This information is a snapshot of the quality of the water that we provided to you in 2011. Included are details about where your water comes from, what it contains, and how it compares to Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and state standards.
Your water comes from three groundwater wells, each over 200 feet deep.The State performed an assessment of our source water to determine the susceptibility or the relative potential of contamination. The susceptibility rating is on a seven-tiered scale from "very-low" to "very-high" based on geologic sensitivity, well construction, water chemistry and contamination sources. The susceptibility of our source is moderate.
There are no Significant sources of contamination in our water supply. We are making efforts to protect our sources by doing annual testing.

- Contaminants and their presence in water: Drinking Water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk.
 potential health effects can be obtained by calling the EPA's Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).
- Vulnerability of sub-populations: Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV / AIDS or other immune systems disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. EPA/CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by Cryptosporidium and other microbial contaminants are available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).
- Sources of drinking water: The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and wells. Our water comes from wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally-occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

- Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations and wildlife.
- Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturallyoccurring or result from urban stormwater runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining or farming.
- Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture and residential uses.
- Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.
- Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban stormwater runoff, and septic systems.
In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations that limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. Food and Drug Administration regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water which provide the same protection for public health.


## Water Quality Data

The table below lists all the drinking water contaminants that we detected during the 2011 calendar year. The presence of these contaminants in the water does not necessarily indicate that the water poses a health risk. Unless otherwise noted, the data presented in this table is from testing done January 1 December 31, 2011. The State allows us to monitor for certain contaminants less than once per year because the concentrations of these contaminants are not expected to vary significantly from year to year. All of the data is representative of the water quality, but some are more than one year old.

Terms and abbreviations used below:

- Maximum Contaminant Level Goal (MCLG): The level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.
- Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL): The highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.
- Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level (MRDL): This means the highest level of a disinfectant allowed in drinking water. There is convincing evidence that addition of a disinfectant is necessary for control of microbial contaminants.
- Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level Goal (MRDLG): This means the level of a drinking water disinfectant below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MRDLGs do not reflect the benefits of the use of disinfectants to control microbial contaminants.
- N/A: Not applicable ND: not detectable at testing limit ppb: parts per billion or micrograms per liter ppm: parts per million or milligrams per liter $\mathrm{pCi} / 1$ : picocuries per liter (a measure of radioactivity).
- Action Level: The concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements that a water system must follow.

Information about lead: If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. The Village of North Branch is responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using water for drinking or cooking. If you are concerned about lead in your water, you may wish to have your water tested. While your drinking water meets EPA's standard for arsenic, it does contain low levels of arsenic. EPA's standard balances the current understanding of arsenic's possible health effects against the costs of removing arsenic from drinking water. EPA continues to research the health effects of low levels of arsenic, which is a mineral known to cause cancer in humans at high concentrations and is linked to other health effects such as skin damage and circulatory problems.

We met all the monitoring and reporting requirements for 2011.
We will update this report annually and will keep you informed of any problems that may occur throughout the year, as they happen. Copies are available at the village office at 4018 Huron Street. This report will not be sent to you.

We invite public participation in decisions that affect drinking water quality. The monthly council meetings are the first Thursday of the month at the village hall, meetings start at 7:00 pm.
