Message from the Superintendent



Dear North Branch School District Families and Community,

The North Branch Board of Education, administrators, teachers, and support staff welcome our students and families to the start of another great school year. Our motto continues to be "All In" and we are committed to providing the best educational experience for all of our students. Thank you to our community for recognizing the continued excellence of North Branch Area Schools and voting our district once again as a destination of choice for county students. In 2018, County Press readers voted North Branch Schools Best of the Best and in 2019 readers chose our district as The County Press Favorite. I am continually reminded that the vast majority of families choose to send their children to our district because of our outstanding employees, specifically our incredibly dedicated teaching staff. As classes begin on Tuesday, August 20 this year, please take a moment to thank a teacher, custodian, secretary, paraprofessional, aide, cook and bus driver for the investment they make on a daily basis in the lives of our children. Our district is fortunate to have loving and caring adults who prioritize the needs of children to ensure they have nutritious meals, a clean and safe environment to learn, secure rides to and from school and quality instruction at all levels.

Yes, we are ready for the start of the 2019/20 school year which will begin for students on Tuesday, August 20. We have included a copy of the district calendar in this publication and ask that you familiarize yourself with the changes that were made for this school year.

Please allow me to share a few updates relative to our Board of Education goals:

GOAL #1: North Branch Area Schools and the Board of Education will teach, measure, and continuously improve instruction aligned with state standards for increased student achievement and College and Career readiness:

- The graduating class of 2019 earned \$3,000,000 + in scholarships to further their education and prepare for meaningful careers;
- We continue to provide a wealth of opportunities for all students including gifted education for grades 3-6. Additional support is being provided to all students at the elementary and next year at Ruth Fox Middle School through MTSS (multi-tiered system of supports which includes enrichment opportunities). Our high school provides several academic offerings including advanced coursework, early middle college and dual enrollment opportunities as well as new courses such as Biomedical and Digital Media. We offer Spanish classes at Ruth Fox Middle School and as enrichment in the elementary school;
- We have made a financial commitment to invest in books for students, especially at the elementary level. Last year, the North Branch Board of Education invested \$50,000 to purchase children's books for all classrooms in the elementary. We are

also fortunate to be able to partner with outside agencies who have graciously agreed to donate books throughout the 2019/20 school year which our children will be able to take home and keep;

- Our teachers have been piloting new Language Arts and Math resources to be purchased this year for elementary, middle school and high school students;
- Under the guidance of Curriculum Director, Amber White, we employ three highly effective instructional coaches who work with all teachers K-8. Theresa Rae is our elementary literacy coach who works with our K-4 teachers to improve literacy skills for our youngest students. She has already finalized plans for our 4th annual All-Star Reading Night which will take place on Monday, September 30 from 6-8 p.m. on the football field. Cindy Lewis is our K-4 math coach and she has made a significant impact in rapidly improving math scores at the elementary and middle school buildings. Our third annual Math Night will be held on Thursday, April 16 from 6-8 p.m. at the elementary school. Finally, we are extremely excited to add Sara Taylor as our new Ruth Fox Middle School Literacy Coach. Sara's expertise will be invaluable as she assists Mr. Terauds and Mr. Barkowska in providing enrichment and/or additional academic support for all students in grades 5-8.

GOAL #2: North Branch Area Schools and the Board of Education will evaluate and enhance opportunities for students by adopting and executing a budget that prioritizes teaching and learning while improving the district's financial stability:

- Three years ago we developed 5-year plans for all curriculum purchases, facility needs, and technology improvements. Those plans have allowed our district to target how we spend public dollars to support classroom needs as well as maintain and improve our overall excellent facilities in the district. Early on we identified areas of need and immediately implemented a plan to save for costly expenditures over a period of time in order to make those purchases. For example:
- The district has updated technology in all buildings including individual teacher classrooms as well as all computer labs;
- Every building has the most updated high definition security cameras to enhance safety for all students and staff;
- A much needed addition to the elementary parking lot will be completed before the start of school;
- The track at the high school is utilized daily for curricular activities during the school day along with middle school and high school sports in addition to community members that enjoy walking and/or running on the track on a regular basis. We have set aside funds each year to pay for a new track at the high school. The life of a track is typically 20 years and our 6-lane track was built in 1994. By the end of the 2019/20 school year, we anticipate having 100% of the funds needed to install a new 8-lane track next summer;
- Our fund equity has increased each year from 8.7%

in 2015/16 to a projected 13.7% with our adopted 2019/20 budget. Three years ago, the Board of Education held a special meeting to share with the community a plan to pay off the district's long-term debt. At that time, we projected we would be debt-free in the year 2041. Our updated conservative projection estimates the district will have all current debt paid off three year earlier (2038). Much like paying a house mortgage, we continue to reduce debt which has allowed us to use general fund dollars for our students.

GOAL # 3: North Branch Area Schools and the Board of Education will validate the importance of every staff member as critical to the success of the district and will maintain partnerships of integrity and trust within the North Branch Community:

- The North Branch Board of Education successfully negotiated two-year contracts with all North Branch employees resulting in a modest 1% increase to the base pay for the 2019/20 school year and a .5% increase for the 2020/21 school year. Teachers will also receive steps and longevity each of the two years. We appreciate the shared commitment our teachers and support staff have with the Board of Education in agreeing to fair contracts which validate the importance of our employees while allowing the district to effectively budget over an extended period of time;
- North Branch Area Schools has always enjoyed tremendous support from the community which is a major reason our district continues to experience great success. We are committed to keeping all community members updated and informed. Please visit our website which is updated daily and click on our social media links located on the front page to get the latest information on school events;
- Speaking of social media and the internet, our school district has arranged for the organization "Protect Young Eyes" to come to North Branch on Monday, December 2 to educate our grade 5-12 students on how to safely use social media apps and the internet in general. There will be a scheduled parent presentation at 7 pm that evening and we will provide more information as we get closer to the date;
- Finally, to strengthen teaching and learning, the district continues to participate in collaborative learning partnerships with MSU, Literacy and Beyond, Lapeer County United Way, the Family Literacy Center, and Dr. Paul Morsink at Oakland University.

So yes, we appreciate county readers recognizing North Branch Schools as "Best of the Best" and a "Favorite" over the past two years and look forward to even more district success during the 2019/20 school year. Annual Pesticide Notification

State of Michigan law requires that schools that may apply pesticides on school property must provide an annual advisory to parents or guardians of students attending the facility.

Please be advised that North Branch Area Schools utilizes an Integrated Pest Management (IPM) approach to control pests. IPM is a pest management system that utilizes all suitable techniques in a total pest management system with the intent of preventing pests from reaching unacceptable levels or to reduce an existing population to an acceptable level. Pest management techniques emphasize sanitation, pest exclusion, and biological controls. One of the objectives of using an IPM approach is to reduce or eliminate the need for chemical applications of pesticides. However, certain situations may require the need for pesticides to be utilized.

As required by State of Michigan law, you will receive advance notice regarding the non-emergency application of a pesticide such as an insecticide, fungicide or herbicide, other than a bait or gel formulation, that is made to the school grounds or buildings during this school year. Please note that notification is not given for the use of sanitizers, germicides, disinfectants or anti-microbial cleaners. In certain emergencies, such as an infestation of stinging insects, pesticides may be applied without prior notice to prevent injury to students, but you will be notified following any such application.

Advance notification of pesticide applications, other than a bait or gel formulation, will be given by at least 2 methods. The first method will be by posting at the main entrance to the school building. The second method will be posting information on the school building web site.

Please be advised that parents or guardians of children attending the school are entitled to receive the advance notice of a pesticide application, other than a bait or gel formulation, by first class United States mail postmarked at least 3 days before the pesticide application, if they so request. If you prefer to receive the notification by first class mail, please complete the information below and submit to:

Please be advised that parents or guardians of children attending the school may review the school's Integrated Pest Management program and records of any pesticide application upon request.

A.H.E.R.A. Notification

The Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act (AHERA) requires that schools be inspected for asbestos at least once every three years. The inspection must identify, catalog, and provide directions for maintaining asbestos found in any school buildings. The inspection reports are on file in the principal's office at each building.

Jeff Drayton, the Facility Supervisor is the designated person responsible for maintaining these records and insuring that any necessary maintenance is properly completed. All of the school district's maintenance and custodial staff have received the required training in understanding and handling issues relating to asbestos containing materials.

North Branch Food Service News



Our Food Service Department welcomes your family for the 2019/20 school year and those families that are new to our school district. North Branch Area Schools will continue to operate our own food service program and we promise to continue to deliver healthy, good, quality food and services to you and your children. North Branch Area Schools follow the USDA Nutrition Standards, and are compliant in the National School Lunch and School Breakfast Programs. We will be offering healthier school lunches with more fresh fruits, vegetables, whole grains, lean proteins and choice of milk.

NEW THIS YEAR

North Branch Food Service offers online access to our menus with calories and carbohydrate counts for parents as well as students for monitoring school lunch and for nutritional tracking online and with a downloadable app. Look under Food Service Department Tab at (www.nbbrncos.net), then under Food Service Menus.

School Meals follow the USDA & MDE guidelines:

- Meat/Meat Alternate
- Grains/Breads
- Juice/Fruit/Vegetable
- Fruit/Vegetable
- Milk



Menu items are offered from all 5 components seen above. In order to be compliant with the National School Lunch Program, your child must select at least 3 of the 5 components (for all grades) for their choices to be considered a meal, which is priced as a unit. If they choose less than the minimum required, their account will be charged separately for each item.

The Household Application for free & reduced priced school meals MUST BE FILLED OUT AND SUBMITTED WITHIN THE FIRST 30 DAYS OF THE 2019-2020 SCHOOL YEAR. Please complete **ONLY ONE APPLICATION PER HOUSEHOLD** and return it as soon as possible. The Household Application for Free and Reduced Price School meals are also available online through Family Access. They are available at every school office and you may contact the Food Service office at (810)688-2226, and one can be sent home. Those families qualifying at the end of last school year will continue to receive free or reduced breakfast and lunch for the first month of school. If the school does **NOT** receive a **NEW** application for 2019-2020 school year, the family's Food Service Account will be adjusted to a paid/normal lunch and breakfast. A new application may be filled out at **ANY TIME** during the year if the household income changes. The Eligibility Chart for the 2019-2020 school year is in the next column above and available at the Michigan Department of Education website as well. It will also be on the Household Application for Free and Reduced Price School Meals.

WHO CAN GET FREE OR REDUCED PRICE MEALS?

- All children in households receiving benefits from State (SNAP), the Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations (FDPIR) or State(TANF) are eligible for free meals.
- Foster children that are under the legal responsibility of a foster care agency or court are eligible for free meals.
- Children participating in their school's Head Start program are eligible for free meals.
- Children who meet the definition of homeless, runaway, or migrant are eligible for free meals.

SPECIAL DIETARY NEEDS

If a doctor has determined that your child has a special food sensitivity/allergy that would prevent the child from eating the regular school meal, the school will make ANY SUBSTITUTIONS PRESCRIBED BY A LICENSED PHYSICIAN. The physician's statement, including prescribed diet and/or substitution, MUST be submitted to the food service department before any special diet can be given to your child. The Michigan Department of Education's Request for Special Dietary Needs Accommodations Form is available through the food service department and also available online at www.nbbrncos.net, located under the Food Service Documents tab, and needs to be filled out by a licensed physician. This provision is State mandated.

- Milk is included with all meals; however, if purchased alone, it is considered Ala Carte and is charged \$0.50, regardless of lunch account type.

North Branch Area Schools participates under the USDA National School Lunch and Breakfast Programs and has a fiscal responsibility to stay in compliance and meet financial accountability; parent/guardians are responsible for meals purchased by their student(s) from the National School Lunch and School Breakfast Programs.

Students are expected to have funds available on their Food Service Account for the purchase of meals. Our system is a pre-paid debit system, therefore when a student purchases a lunch or breakfast, the amount is automatically deducted from the student's Food Service Account. The preferred method of payment is to pay online through the school's website www.nbbrncos.net, from the home page by going to the Parent and Student Tab, then sign in to Family and Student Access. Payments may also be sent in with your student (cash/check) or may be mailed to **North Branch Area Schools, ATTN: Food Service, PO Box 3620, North Branch, MI 48461.**

Families are encouraged to prepay for meals, it will help to ensure children have consistent access to healthy, reimbursable meals without accruing unpaid meal charges. Please see the New Food Service Policy below:

FOOD SERVICE POLICY: REGARDING FOOD SERVICE ACCOUNTS

- Students are not allowed to charge more than 4 lunches (negative balance of more than \$10.00).
- A peanut butter and jelly or cheese sandwich with fruit and white milk will be offered, at \$0.75 and will be charged to the student's Food Service Account each time, once the student's lunch account is negative \$10.00.
- Ala Carte items are CASH ONLY or students MUST have funds on their Food Service Account. Charges are never allowed for Ala Carte items.
- If a student's balance is negative more than \$10.00, the student may still purchase a lunch with cash, but they may not purchase Ala Carte items.
- A full (reimbursable) lunch consists of 3 of the 5 components offered, (though 5 items may be taken); main entrée, fruit, vegetable, bread and milk.
- Purchasing milk alone is \$0.50 cents regardless of lunch account type.
- Adults and Staff are encouraged to have funds on their Food Service Accounts or pay at point of service. No charging is allowed.
- Adjustments will only be made by the Food Service Department.

NORTH BRANCH EARLY COLLEGE

North Branch's early middle college program, formally known as the STEMM Academy, has a new name: the "North Branch Early College" (NBEC). Our Early College is no longer focused only on Science, Technology, Engineering and Math. The program provides students with college courses in general education that can be transferred to any college belonging to the Michigan Transfer Agreement (the vast majority of colleges and universities in the state. The program is now partnered with Baker College, Mott Community College and Rochester University.

WHAT IS AN EARLY COLLEGE? Early college high schools enable students entering their junior year to simultaneously earn a high school diploma and either an associate's degree, the Michigan Early/Middle College Association (MEMCA) technical certification or up to 60 transferable college credits at the same time, tuition free. The NBEC has two different models in place:

TRADITIONAL MODEL: Students in their junior year would take 6 college courses at the Education and Technology Center in a two hour block. In their senior year, students would take an additional 7 college courses at the Education and Technology Center in a three-hour block. In their 13 year, stu-

dents would take a minimum of 12 college credits per semester at a Baker College Campus, a Mott Community College Campus or Rochester University Campus.

CTE BLEND MODEL: Students in their junior year would take 1 college course at the Education and Technology Center in a one-hour block after their Ed-Tech program. In their senior year, they would take 3 college courses at the Education and Technology Center in a one-hour block after their Ed-Tech program. In their 13th year, students would take a minimum of 12 college credits per semester at a Baker College Campus or a Mott Community College Campus and receive additional college credit for their CTE successful completion.

The North Branch Early College is a unique and great way for your son or daughter to get a jump start on earning their college credentials, with little to no cost to their family.

We are excited to announce to our parents, students and community that this Fall, North Branch High School will be starting its MTSS program. Multi-Tiered System of Supports (MTSS) is defined as an integrated, multi-tiered system of instruction, assessment, and intervention designed to meet the achievement and behavioral health needs of ALL learners. In short, North Branch High School's goal is to provide a framework designed to ensure that each and every student that walks into a classroom will have his or her individual academic and social-emotional needs met. We will carry out this goal through a team approach of using a variety of data to 1) create processes for the monitoring of all students' attendance, grades and behavior, 2) create processes for identifying struggling students; and 3) creating plans and pathways to maximize their growth and success.

Mrs. Howe will return as an English Teacher (having taught 13 years of ELA prior to her 6 years of Administration) with a new role as MTSS Interventionist. In this role, she will:

- Co-teach /guest teach to walk through instructional strategies in writing and close reading.

- Coordinates with counselors/ social worker to keep at risk students on track for successful completion of grade and graduation
- Manage check and connect "caseload" of at risk students
- Works with administrative team & student assistance team to coordinate professional development and school improvement team goals
- Develop and maintain Early Warnings Systems dashboard
- Coordinate problem-solving committees related to goals of MTSS such as the Student Assistance Team
- Communicate progress and plans for MTSS, Tier one support in writing and PD options
- Look for and provide opportunities to help staff and students be their best

This is an incredible opportunity we are pleased to provide ALL our students at NBHS and we are ready to begin the new school year with even more opportunity for growth and success with the implementation of MTSS.

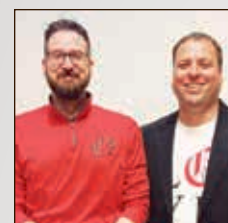


Quest Hosts TASL Championship

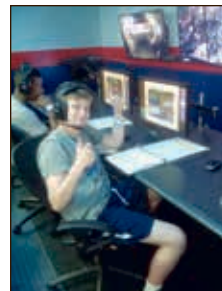
