Food Service News

North Branch Area Schools continues to operate our own food service program for the 2015-16 school year and we promise to continue to deliver healthy, good, quality food and services to you and your children.

Breakfast is offered daily in all schools. Students who eat breakfast perform better in school. Research shows that students who eat a healthy breakfast show increased attention at school, visit the nurse less often and have lower rates of tardiness and absenteeism.

If a doctor has determined that your child has a special food sensitivity/allergy that would prevent the child from eating the regular school meal, the school will make ANY SUBSTITUTION PRESCRIBED BY A LICENSED PHYSICIAN. The physician's statement, including prescribed diet and/or substitution, must be submitted to the food service department before any special diet can be given to your child. These forms are available through the food service office and need to be filled out by a licensed physician. This provision is State mandated.

All applications for Free and Reduced Price School Meals submitted to the food service department have been processed. Those families qualifying for free or reduced meals have received their notification and code. As of October 16, 2015, if the school did not receive a new application for the 2015-2016 school year, the family has been adjusted to a paid/normal lunch (PLEASE SEE THE CHART BELOW FOR THE HOUSEHOLD INCOME LIMITS FOR THE 2015-2016 SCHOOL YEAR.)

Qualifying for Free and Reduced Meals

Your child(ren) may qualify for free or reduced price school meals if your household income falls within the limits on this chart.

If your household income changes at any time during the school year, you may submit another application. Also, if you receive food assistance, you may qualify for free or reduced meals.

School meals follow the USDA guidelines:

Menu items are offered from all 5 components seen to the right. Your child must select at least 3 of the 5 components (for all grades) for their choices to be considered a meal, which is priced as a unit. If they choose less than the minimum required, their account will be charged separately for each item.

Milk is included with all meals; however, if purchased without a meal it is considered ala carte and is charged \$0.50.

Payment for meals is due at the time of purchase. No charging is allowed. Meals are deducted at the time of purchase and are on a debit system. Meals may be paid for with cash/check or on-line through PaySchools. Payments can be mailed to: North Branch Area Schools, ATTN: Food Service, PO Box 3620, North Branch, MI 48461. Policy Regarding Food Service Accounts

It is the school's policy that once an account is negative \$5.00, or more, the student will receive a Peanut Butter and Jelly sandwich with white milk for their lunch until payment (or payment arrangements) is made.


What Is Ala Carte?

Ala carte items are "Cash Only" unless there is money on the child's food service account. These items are not part of the breakfast or lunch reimbursable meal program. Some examples of ala carte items include – a single purchase OR extra milk or juice, cookies, chips, an additional entrée, ice cream and other non-menu items. If a parent or guardian wishes their child to only purchase a breakfast and/ or lunch, they may contact the food service office and controls may be placed on the account to block or limit ala carte purchases.

AP Scholar Awards

During the first two weeks of May, students across the country who took Advanced Placement classes are able to earn college credit by earning a 3, 4 or 5 on the Advanced Placement. Students who excel on multiple AP tests are honored with the title of AP Scholar, AP Scholar with Honor or AP Scholar with Distinction.

The AP Scholar award is granted to students who receive scores of 3 or higher on three or more AP Exams. North Branch High School is proud to recognize the following NBHS students who earned this designation for the 2014-15 school year: Kayla Belavek; Talon Sherrieb; Brianna Walters.

The AP Scholar with Honor award is granted to students who receive an average score of at least 3.25 on all AP Exams taken, and scores of 3 or higher on four or more of these exams.

The AP Scholar with Distinction award is granted to students who receive an average score of at least 3.5 on all AP Exams taken, and scores of 3 or higher on five or more of these exams. The following NBHS student earned this designation for the 2014-15 school year: Fox Parton.




North Branch Robotics Team

Quest Students Share their Ed-Tech Success



Along with those students excelling in hands on environment, Quest High School students as a whole have experienced great success. Currently over half of Quest students are receiving a B or better in their chosen programs.


Quest Lends a Helping Hand

ELLIOTT ORR MEMORIAL PAVILLION

Rick Skelton and Chuck Jacobson of our Buildings and Grounds along with the assistance of the North Branch Soccer team have started construction of the Elliott Orr Memorial Pavillion. Elliott was a former player and coach for North Branch.



The North Branch athletic programs have made a commitment to do volunteer work in the schools and the community. Boys' and Girls' Cross Country, Cheerleading, Football, Boys' Soccer, and Volleyball participated in various volunteer and service projects this fall. In the picture above, the varsity football team spent the better part of a day helping unload and put woodchips on the elementary playground. In addition, our student-athletes performed extremely well in the classroom with 67.9% (127 out of 187 fall student-athletes) earning a 3.2 or higher grade point average at the mid-term of the first trimester.

Community Hall of Fame

This organization was founded for the purpose of recognizing individuals or teams with significant achievement who have made outstanding contributions to North Branch Area Schools. Hall of Fame inductees could have excelled in academics, arts, athletics, or volunteerism while at North Branch Area Schools either as a student, teacher, coach, team, administrator, parent volunteer, or community member. This could also include individuals who have distinguished themselves as successful adults in their respective careers, including those who have received honors through meritorious service in selected careers and/or have served as benefactors of mankind.

Criteria for Nominations

- A. All candidates must be nominated on an official Community Hall of Fame nominating form.
- B. The candidate must be eligible in one of the following categories:
 - 1. The nominee, if a former STUDENT, ATHLETE OR TEAM, must wait at least (10) years from the time of his/her class graduated from North Branch High School.
 - 2. The nominee, if a COACH, must have departed from the North Branch High School athletic program and must have made an outstanding contribution to the athletic program during his/her tenure.
 - 3. The nominee, if a SCHOOL OFFICIAL (employee), must have departed from North Branch Area Schools and must have made an outstanding contribution to North Branch Area Schools during his/her tenure.
 - 4. The nominee, if a COMMUNITY MEMBER, will be considered if ongoing and outstanding contributions have been made to programs at North Branch Area Schools.
- C. The nominee must have demonstrated good citizenship in school and after leaving school.

4th Graders Visit Camp Lael

In September, all fourth graders attended an outdoor ecology camp in Lapeer for 3 days. This camp has 250 acres of beautiful, rolling hills, swamps, and woods located five miles west of Lapeer on Skinner Lake. Camp Lael provides a fun, safe, nurturing learning environment for children. The program is designed and implemented by Peter McCreedy, an outdoor naturalist. For several years, our fourth graders have been able to visit the camp and engage in a program which takes place during the regular school day.

This program is part of a unit of study in 4th grade science and is designed to build students' awareness of ecology by engaging them in fun, experiential, hands-on activities. The curriculum during this three-day program included several classes. In the plants and animals class students learned about wild edible plants, hiking, pond study, and beaver adaptation and habitat. The lake ecology class had students canoeing, testing water quality, and performing a pond study. Students learned about food webs in a predator/prey activity that also had them exploring acres and acres of camp. Finally, students were able to work together in team-building activities.

All fourth grade students represented North Branch Area Schools by being respectful, responsible, and safe!
