## Superintendent's Corner

## Putting the Future in Perspective

I know many of you have had an opportunity to read in the news lately that we will experience over a million dollar deficit during the 2008-09 school year. I want all parents and community members to understand that this is a projection or our best guess as we
 plan for next year

This projection is based on the current state of the Michigan economy and not the condition of North Branch Area Schools. The problem is, as Michigan loses jobs and young families have to move, programs and services are severely impacted. Since 2004 Lapeer County Schools have lost 546 students. Our biggest loss came just this year; we lost 67 students from the fall of 2006 to the fall of 2007. This is the first year since 2000 that North Branch didn't see an increase in students.

The million dollar deficit reported in the news for 2008-09 is based on a projected loss of 47 students for next year. The loss of students coupled with increased costs in insurance, retirement, and operations are the reasons we are concerned. As we plan with the Board of Education for the opening of our new schools we are working to identify our priorities for the future. Keeping in mind what is in the best interest of our students.

I believe that we have been able to maintain students because of our reputation. While many schools have lost students we have experienced a significant increase in students attending North Branch as "School of Choice" students. These are students who reside in neighboring districts but who choose to attend North Branch as their school of choice.
So as we struggle through these difficult times we must keep a positive perspective and remember that North Branch Area Schools has been very fortunate. Because of your support we will have some of the best facilities in the Thumb of Michigan. These facilities along with our strong reputation will help us draw students to our district. As we make our decisions for next year we will do our very best not to impact the children.


## Construction Update:

 A Picture is Worth a thousand WordsThe collage of pictures tells the story of the construction on the new elementary schools Jefferson Trail and Elm Creek, set to open in the fall of 2008. The project started a bit behind due to the state delay in approving the building permit. But our goal is to open as soon as we can next fall. We are hoping for a very mild winter to assist the workers in completing the project.

On the remaining projects we also plan to have the new cafetorium and remodeling completed on Ruth Fox and the Middle School when we open next September 2008. This project will next September 2008. This project will date of March, 2008. As a result of all the new construction we anticipate some inconveniences but as you know
when you are remodeling or building a new home all the headaches are worth it in the end.
Once the students move into
Jefferson Trail and Elm Creek Elementary Schools, we will begin the renovation of the Jefferson and 1980's wing of North Branch Elementary Once remodeled, the old elementary will house the district's Central Offices, Quest High School, and FABS Child Care Program. Depending on enrollments and the need for additional space the building may also house the district pre-school programs. During this same time we will build a new transportation facility to replace the old bus garage on Banker Street. Our goal is to have all construction completed by the fall of 2009 .

Statewide and Nationwide there are budget challenges to maintaining public assets weighed against maintaining public safety. The road commissions around our state are going to continue to plow and salt, but they are modifying their services to gain efficiencies wherever they can. Their efficiency can and will impact our decisions regarding cancelling school due to inclement weather.

As a district we have decided to try an old idea with some new twists, in order to try and maintain the school year as best as we are able. We are re-introducing a "Main Roads Only" busing alternative for those inclement weather days where main roads are very passable, but the side roads are not for buses with children on board. ## 2006-2007 Fiscal Year End General Fund Financial Report

The audit report for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2007 was presented to the Board of Education at their regular meeting November 12, 2007. Yeo \& Yeo, P.C. gave the district an excellent evaluation regarding the financial review conducted by their firm. In the 2006-2007 fiscal year, the district had operating revenues of $\$ 21,183,009$. The district expenditures were $\$ 21,059,638$ resulting in an addition of $\$ 123,371$ to the fund balance. The current fund balance is $13.8 \%$ of the operational expenditures for 2006-2007. The daily operational cost of the dis trict is approximately $\$ 57,698$.

North Branch Area Schools employed 145 teachers, 131 support staff, 14 administrators and a number of substitute workers The school district is one of the largest employers in the area and the majority of our employees live within the boundaries of our school district. Since the school district's main resource is its personnel, this is the largest expense of the district, and approximately $85 \%$ of the total expenditures were for wages and benefits paid to district employees.
The student enrollment for the Fall count of 2006 was 2,768 pupils, which is up 77 students from the prior year. In May of 2007, we had 197 students graduate from the high school. Approximately $86 \%$ of these students have enrolled in college or the military.

The district's property base continues to grow. Property values increased from 298.7 million in 2005 to 320.2 million in 2006 This represents a $7.2 \%$ increase over the previous year. The fiveyear average growth in property value is $6.7 \%$.

Although the district is financially sound, the economic environment has caused considerable concern over future funding for schools. Our greatest concern is that the state provides over $90 \%$ of the operating revenue to the district so our resources are directly impacted by the issues affecting the state both economically and politically. This is not a unique problem for North Branch Area Schools it impacts all the public schools in Michigan.

Within minutes, school officials can use e-Alert to deliver a single, clear message to students, parents, guardians and staff members by cell phone and / or email. This system will be used to announce emergencies, delayed openings and school closings.

If by chance your student(s) haven't brought home your notice for our new eAlert system please ask them to do so. With the support of the Tuscola County Advertiser we are now able to offer this service FREE OF CHARGE.

- The decision to cancel the regular school day program is usually made about 5:30 am/no later than 6:00 a.m. if possible. Only in unusually severe weather conditions is a decision made the night before.
- Occasionally school is dismissed early because of weather or afternoon kindergarten classes may be cancelled. These announcements will be made on the same stations indicated above. - It is very important that all parents talk with their children about the procedure to be followed in the event of early release. The school must be notified in advance of any special arrangements or transportation
- Planning in advance reduces stress and anxiety for your children and saves many last minute phone calls to the school.

- In the event of a tornado or severe thunderstorm watches/warnings it may be necessary to extend the school day rather than send children home in threatening weather.
- Generally, decisions or information about athletic events and other extracurricular activities on days when school is cancelled will be made after 10:30 a.m.

## Michigan Promise Scholarship

The Michigan Promise scholarship provides up to $\$ 4,000$ to high school graduates after successfully completing two years of postsecondary education. Students who receive qualifying scores (Level II or above) in each of the required components on the Michigan Merit Exam
 (MME), are eligible to receive half of their Michigan (MME), are eligible to receive half of their Michigan
Promise scholarship during the first two years of pos Promise scholarship during the first two years of post secondary education ( $\$ 1,000$ in the first year and $\$ 1,000$ in the second year). The Michigan Merit Examination (MME) is the state assessment administered to all students enrolled in Grade 11 in March of each year. The MME consists of three major components: the ACT college entrance examination, the WorkKeys job skills assessments in reading and mathematics, and Michigan assessments in mathematics, science, social studies, and persuasive writing. The combined MME assessment measures student learning in the Michigan high school standards, benchmarks, and core content expectations. All NBHS 11th grade students will take the MME on March 11th through the 13th. Seniors, who did not retake the MME this past fall, can retake the test in March with the Juniors. All NBHS Seniors who receive qualifying scores (Level II or above) in each of the required components on the Michigan Merit Exam (MME), will be exempt from taking their final exams at the end of the third trimester in May.

## MIDDLE SCHOOL NEWS

As the second trimester begins, the middle school office staff has found itself very busy. The most welcoming change has been the addition of Jamie Buike to our professional staff. Jamie, a resident of North Branch Area School District, was hired last month to teach 7th and 8th grade math. The reason for this addition was simple: more students enrolled at the middle school than expected. She will begin her teaching assignments at the beginning of the second trimester. Up until then, other teachers had to take on an extra teaching assignment during their regularly scheduled planning period.

Adding a teacher has caused many student schedules to change. A student who had Mr. Mitchell for English may now have Mrs. Schulte. A student who had Mr. Peplinski for math may now have Mrs. Buike. Students will see smaller class sizes in their core classes, and some staff will inherit back their planning period.

The benefits of adding a teacher outweigh the concerns of changing teachers mid-year. It is true that for some of our students they will receive a new teacher for a certain number of core classes. Many educational leaders would comment that it is important for teachers to create a relationship with their students on the first day of school. In his book, The First Days of School: How to be an Effective Teacher, Harry Wong says, "What you do on the first days of school will determine your success or failure for the rest of the school year." Connecting and forming relationships with students on the first day of school and on is important in getting them receptive to their teacher's classroom instruction. Adding a new teacher to the staff and rescheduling some of your student population with different teachers does not lend itself to Harry Wong's insightful message. However, I believe Mr. Wong would agree, as does the Board of Education, that class sizes should be maintained at optimum numbers. As to Mr. Wong's quote, the middle school is treating the first day of the second trimester as that new chance (or second chance, for some) to connect and make meaningful relationships with their students.

Our mission has always been to create the best learning environment to prepare our students for their transition to the high school. Smaller class sizes and, periodically, changing teachers fulfills that mission.
